coming crown and rule over the three days of festivities as "Princess of the Utes" featured Wednesday's developments of the annual week when old grads return to campus haunts and when the university turns to one final festive fling before winter settles over the city. the city.

Lorraine Hyde, Pi Beta Phi, and Adrienne Earl, Kappa Kappa Gamma, were selected "squaw" attendants to Miss Jensen.

Fraternities, sororities and independent groups will vie during the celebration for honors in presentation of skits, house decoration, varsity quartets and floats in the Homecoming parade Saturday morning.

Tryouts held for finalists in the skit contest resulted in the selec-tion of three fraternities, three sororities and one men's and one women's independent groups.

Skit Finalists Announced

Successful fraternities are Pi Kappa Alpha, Sigma Chi and Sigma Nu, while sorority finalists are Chi Omega, Pi Beta Phi, and Alpha Chi Omega.

Carlson hall was placed as the women's independent finalist, and the Capitol club will compete in men's competition.

Silver loving cups will be presented winning organizations in each division of competition, and a sweepstakes prize will be awarded the group which amasses the most points for all-around competition.

. "Utes No Let Paleface In-Ugh!" is the Homecoming theme, and skits and house decorations as well as floats will be connected with it.

Principal Thursday activities include a pie-eating contest on the steps of the Park building at noon, judging of fraternity and sorority house decorations at 6:30 p. m. and presentation of skits at 7:30 p. m. in Kingsbury hall.

Following the skits, Utahns will gather on South Wolcott street for the annual Sigma Nu street dance and rally. Music and yells will be broadcast from the steps of the house on a short radio program.

Lower Classmen to Battle

Annual all-night battle between the Frosh and Sophomores will get under way at 10 p. m. when flares are lighted about the block U on the east hills. The rivals will camp and carouse about the hills until 6 a. m. Friday when the sophs will attempt to wrest possession of a pile of logs guarded by the green-ling class.

Friday, Armistice Day and a school holiday, will be marked by fraternity and sorority open houses, the fraternities throwing open their doors from 2 to 4 p. m. and the sororities from 4 to 6 p. m.

Vocal quartets will sing from the steps of greek-letter houses beginning at 7 p. m., with students following judges from house to house and then to the Union building where they will form a caravan for a trek through the business district. Carlson hall is the first stop on the route to be taken by quartet judges. The swing band will accompany the caravan.

Parading of floats beginning at 10 a. m. Saturday morning will bring the celebration activities up to the crucial moment before the gridiron classic in the Ute stadium at 2 p. m.

Assembling east of Second East street on Fourth South at 9:30 a. m., the parade will proceed up Main street to South Temple, thence east on South Temple to Second East street, where it will disband.

"Three generation" studentsfamilies in which there are three generations of university graduates —will hold a feature spot in the parade. Several cars of "three generation" students will be included.

The parade will appear again just before the game in the stadium, making a circuit of the running track.

Following the game alumni will renew old times when they convene in the Union building for class meetings, and the grand finale of the celebration, the Homecoming dance, will be held at 9
